

Location

The Village of Dodge, part of the Fremont Micropolitan Statistical area, is located in Dodge County in northeast Nebraska. Served by Nebraska Highway 91, Dodge is 35 miles northwest of Fremont, 50 miles southeast of Norfolk, 71 miles northwest of Omaha, 75 miles northwest of Lincoln, and 80 miles southwest of Sioux City, Iowa.

Elevation

Dodge is 1,350 feet above sea level.



Economic Development



The Dodge Community Club works with the Village of Dodge and the Greater Fremont Economic Development Council for economic development in the community.

The Greater Fremont Development Council (GFDC), a nonprofit corporation, is comprised of 122 members. Funds are received from annual dues, city and county governments, and dedicated fundraisers.

The Greater Fremont Development Council works in collaboration with the business community, City of Fremont, Dodge County, the Fremont Chamber of Commerce, and other organizations to provide opportunities for business retention, attraction and growth throughout Dodge County. This successful partnership provides an effective and efficient means of the common goal of creating jobs and investment opportunities, which ultimately result in a higher quality of life for the citizens of Dodge County.

Approximately five acres of land in and adjacent to the community are zoned for industry. The price of industrially zoned land ranges from \$10,000 to \$15,000 per acre.

Firms with retail sales tax permits in Dodge reported 2023 net taxable retail sales of \$3,468,439, while Dodge County reported retail sales of \$705.796.962.



Market Access

Highways

Dodge is located one mile north of two-lane, east-west Nebraska Highway 91 and five miles west of two-lane, south bound Nebraska Highway 79. There are no local load restrictions. U.S. Highway 275 is four-laned from Scribner (12 miles east of Dodge) to Omaha. Interstate 29 is 55 miles east and Interstate 80 is 70 miles southeast of Dodge.

Trucklines

More than 13,500 licensed motor carriers with worldwide connections are based in Nebraska and serve businesses throughout North America.

Rail

Amtrak provides Omaha, 71 miles southeast of Dodge, with rail passenger service throughout the United States. Additional Nebraska Amtrak stations are located in Hastings, Holdrege, Lincoln, and McCook. For more information, visit amtrak.com.

Air

The Fremont Municipal Airport is located 35 miles southeast of Dodge. It has two lighted and hard-surfaced runways (6,353 foot and 2,315 foot). The airport has aviation fuel, aircraft parking (ramp and tiedown), hangars, passenger terminal and lounge, flight training, aircraft rental, aerial tours/aerial sightseeing, aircraft maintenance, aircraft cleaning/washing/detailing, and aircraft parts. The elevation at the airport is 1,204 feet, the latitude is 41-26N, and the longitude is 096-W.

Nebraska Highlights

Energy costs are often a considerable part of any business' operational budget. These costs can vary greatly between states, but in Nebraska (the only state in the nation where all electric utilities are publicly owned) electric costs are passed to consumers at low, cost-of-service rates. As a result, the state offers industrial rates well below the national average. Nebraska electric utilities achieve low rates, in part, because they draw from a balanced and efficient "mix" of generation resources.


Electricity

Cuming County Public Power District (CCPPD), a wholesale customer of Nebraska Public Power District (NPPD), provides retail electric service to the village of Dodge and the surrounding areas. Dodge is served from CCPPD 34.5/4.16kV, 5,000 kVA substation with 34,500 volt three-way feed from the Nebraska statewide high voltage grid system. The distribution system is 4,160 volts with two lines feeding the city.

Water & Sewerage

The municipal water system in Dodge is supplied by two wells, which have an average depth of 86 feet. The system, serving the entire city, has a combined pumping capacity of 590 gallons per minute and an overhead storage capacity of 50,000 gallons. The average daily demand is 60,000 gallons, and the historic peak daily demand is 130,000 gallons.

The system has a maximum capacity of 899,600 gallons per day. The static pressure is 55 pounds per square inch and the residual pressure is 50 pounds per square inch.

The city's wells produce up to 600 gallons of water per minute. The water table has not changed significantly in the past five years. The quality of water in Dodge does not necessitate a water treatment plant.

Water Rates - A deposit of \$250.00 is charged for residential and commercial customers. A connection fee of \$50.00, a tapping fee of \$140.00 for 3/4-inch pipe, or a tapping fee of \$215.00 for 1-inch pipe.

Recycling

Recyclables are collected by Firstar Fiber. These items are accepted: newsprint, chipboard, magazines and corrugated cardboard, on the first and third Saturday of every month from 9AM - 11:00AM.





United States Post Office -Dodge

Local Government

The Village of Dodge is governed by a Board of Trustees. Board of Trustees are elected at large for four-year terms and village clerk/treasurer is appointed by the chairman of the board for a one-year term.

Dodge County has 14 townships and is governed by a seven-member Board of Supervisors, who are elected by popular vote for four-year terms. Dodge County belongs to the Northeast Nebraska Economic Development District with 16 other counties.

Fire & Rescue

Fire protection is provided to the village by a 20-member volunteer fire department.

The department responds to 911 medical emergencies with a fullequipped resue squad. A second unit is available for non-emergency transports.

The Rural Fire District provides protection to areas outside the community and responds to mutual aid calls with area communities.

Dodge has one fire station and 49 fire hydrants. The fire insurance classification inside the corporate limits is 7; outside it is 7X. Annual expenditures for fire protection for the past three years averaged \$50,000.

Law Enforcement

The Dodge/Snyder Police Department employs two part-time officers. The patrol division equipment consists of one patrol car. Annual expenditures for police protection for the last three years average \$80,000.

Sheriff

The Dodge County Sheriff's Department has 18 sworn officers, six dispatchers; and four support personnel.

State Patrol

Troop A of the Nebraska State Patrol is headquartered in Omaha, 71 miles southeast of Dodge.

The Planning Commission consists of five members and one alternate member.



Quality of Life

Hospital

The Methodist Fremont Health Center (MFHC) was built in 2002 in Fremont. The facility, located 35 miles southeast of Dodge, is a 262-bed health care facility, includes 100 hospital bed private rooms. There are more than 60 physicians on the Courtesy/ Consulting staff. MFHC employs over 800 individuals in various professional and support staff positions. This nonprofit hospital offers a full range of primary care service, including cardiovascular care, care for women, center for wound healing, family,

infectius disease, travel medicine, internal medicine, orthopedics and sports medicine, surgery center, and surgical group.

Speciality clinics at the hospital include cancer care, heart and vascular imaging, radiology, orthopedic surgery, rehabilitation and physical therapy, wellness, women's health, A.J. Merrick Manor, behavioral medicine, back and spine, diabetes, diet/nutrition services, emergency, home health care, hospice, laboratory services, mental health services, nephrology outpatient services, prostate center, senior care, sleep disorders, speakers bureau, sports medicine, stroke, surgery services, and urology.

Franciscan Healthcare is a private hospital located in West Point, 20 miles northeast of Dodge.The hospital provides acute care and in-and-out patient services.

Special clinics at the hospital include pain management, cardiology, psychiatry, OB/GYN, ENT, neurosurgery, orthopedic, nephrology, neurology, vascular surgery, radiation, oncology, general surgery, podiatry, ophthalmology, urology, and pulmonology.

Business health and wellness, emergency services, laboratory, occupational therapy, patient care, radiology, speech therapy, cardiopulmonary rehibilitation, home health/hospice/personal care, obstetrical and newborn care, oncology, physical therapy, respiratory, surgery and anesthesia are provided at Franciscan Healthare in West Point. Agriculture

In 2023, Nebraska ranked first among the states in beef and beef product exports; third in corn exports and grain production. Nebraska's farms and ranches utilized 44 million acres or 89 percent of the state's total land area. Cash receipts from farm markets in 2022 contributed more than \$31.6 billion to the state's economy. Of that 52 percent originated from livestock and 48 percent from crops.

Groundwater

One of Nebraska's most vital natural resources is its massive supply of groundwater. The High Plains Aquifer, also commonly referred to as the **Ogallala Aquifer**, stretches through parts of eight states, but its most abundant water resource is located in nearly two-thirds of Nebraska. This groundwater availability has been essential to the success of agriculture in the state.

Center pivot irrigation is the most common method of providing water to row crops in the state, and as a result, four of the largest manufacturers of center pivot systems in the world are located in Nebraska. Nebraska has more than 100,000 registered irrigation wells.







Surface Water

Nebraska's surface water resources are surprisingly extensive, including approximately 18,000 miles of continuously flowing rivers and streams and about 430 square miles of lakes.

Surface water is predominantly used by grazing livestock as its source drinking water.

An accessible water supply also is vital to Nebraska's livestock and dairy production.

The Nebraska Department of Natural Resources maintains responsibility for administration of surface water rights. In locations where groundwater and surface water are connected, the responsibility is shared among the NRDs and the state for achieving a sustainable balance between water supplies and water use.

Climate


Four Distinct Seasons

Nebraska has a continental climate, with hot summers and cold winters. Temperatures are highly variable from season to season and year to year. The majority of the state has an average annual maximum temperature of 60°F to 65°F with average annual minimum temperatures in the 30°F to 40°F range. State temperature records are -47°F and 118°F. The average number of days in excess of 100°F range from 5 (northeast) to 11 (southwest) with most of the state between 6 and 9 days. Minimum temperatures below zero occur on average 7 days per year in southeast Nebraska to 20 days in north-central Nebraska.


Precipitation

Precipitation is also variable and ranges from an annual average of 15 to 20 inches in the west to 30 to 35 inches in southeast Nebraska. Approximately 75 percent of the precipitation falls as rain from April to September. Annual average snowfall ranges from 20 inches in the southeast to 50 inches in the northwest. Snowfall usually increases during late winter and reaches a maximum in March


Annual Maximum Temperature (F)
